EMERGENCY MED

CLINICAL ROTATION INFORMATION

DESCRIPTION

Students work one-on-one with an upper-level resident and attending physician for 14-15 shifts over a four-week period. Students receive hands-on clinical experience involving emergency patients. Students complete history and physical examinations, assist in emergency procedures, and discuss treatment and disposition options with the supervising physician. Students attend didactic sessions with the residents every Wednesday from 7:00AM to 12:00PM. This includes formal lectures presented by faculty and staff as well as skills labs, journal club, and simulation training.

Students complete a 10 to 15-minute presentation at didactics and sit for an end-of-rotation exam. Both factor into the student's final grade for the rotation.

GOALS & OBJECTIVES

BY THE END OF THE ROTATION, THE STUDENT WILL:

- Appropriately triage emergency patients
- Diagnose and initiate treatment of common acute emergency and non-emergency conditions
- Formulate final disposition of patients (i.e. consult, admit, discharge, and referral)
- Experience basic emergency department procedures
- Formulate information gathered from patients into a justifiable differential diagnosis
- Generate initial diagnostic and therapeutic plans
- Assist resident and attending physicians with plan execution, treatment, and reassessment of patients

EVALUATION PROCESS

A composite evaluation is completed by the course director at the end of the rotation. This evaluation is derived from written feedback by a mix of residents and attendings who had direct interaction with the student.

EXPECTATIONS

PRESENTATION: All medical students must prepare a 10-15 minute presentation to be given during resident lecture time.

EXAM: All medical students must take an end-of-rotation exam. The exam is a 40-question, multiple choice test. Student must schedule a time to sit for the exam by contacting the GME Office.


LECTURE ATTENDANCE: All students are expected to attend resident lectures every Wednesday from 7:00am to noon. Unless students are granted time off, they must attend even if they are not scheduled for a shift on lecture day.

GRADING

50% based on evaluations by residents and attendings

30% based on your end-of-rotation exam

20% based on your student presentation

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

TIPS FOR SUCCESS

Gather history, perform physical, and formulate a plan and differential diagnosis.

Take ownership of the patient and perform rechecks.

Update patient on lab and radiology findings.
